This issue of the IJEE is devoted entirely to the theme: *Design Education: Innovation and Entrepreneurship.* The papers included in this issue are revised and expanded versions of papers selected from contributions to the Mudd Design Workshop VIII, held in May 2011. The Harvey-Mudd design workshops are one of the most important thematic workshops; it attracted engineering design educators, researchers, and practitioners from around the world to discuss current and important topics in engineering design education. The workshops are held biannually in Claremont, California; the workshop of 2011 was the largest gathering ever. The last issue of the IJEE that was devoted to the Harvey-Mudd workshop was in 2010 (vol. 26, issue 2) with the theme *Sustaining Sustainable Design.* I hope the current issue will be welcomed with the same interest and enthusiasm as the previous issues were.

I would like to seize this opportunity to congratulate him again on being co-awarded, with Professors M. Mack Gilkeson and J. Rich Phillips, the NAE's 2012 Bernard M. Gordon Prize for *creating and disseminating innovations in undergraduate engineering design education to develop engineering leaders*. The Prize is presented annually during National Engineers Week in February. It carries a cash award of US\$500,000, half of the amount granted to the recipient and the other half to the recipient's institution.

Also, I would like to thank the members of the Harvey Mudd Workshop organizing committee, the reviewers, and the authors. Their work will definitely be appreciated by the engineering education community at large and the readers of this journal in particular.
